African Community Engagement – Phase 2: Diary of a Confused Immigrant

African Cultural Services will continue the work begun in 2018. Plans are to further develop partnerships via gathering and telling immigrants' stories. The Director will expand her role as a community engagement expert and open up more doors to dialog. There will be additional performances of the "Diary of a confused Immigrant", and the Director will visit families' homes to interview and record their stories.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Members of First Parish are invited to visit and enjoy the many cultural events held at the ACS Center. Also, community members will plan an activity to be held at the church.

The Cat Connection \$1,500

**Cat Food Pantry**

**The Project:** The Cat Connection plans to continue its efforts to support low- income pet owners through the creation of a Cat Food Pantry, to prevent cat abandonment and encourage rehoming. There are multiple food pantries in the area, but they do not generally carry pet food. Creating a food pantry will enable the group to reach out to more cat owners to provide assistance through other ongoing programs, such as CatNAPS spay/neuter assistance and behavioral counseling.

**Partnering Opportunities:** The Cat Connection will coordinate with the Religious Education program to plan a visit/talk at church. Also, children in the RE program will be encouraged to participate in food and pet supply drives.

Chaplains on the Way \$1,700

Women's Spiritual Arts Group

**The Project:** The goal of Chaplains on the Way (COTW) Women's Spiritual Arts Group is to bring emotional and spiritual support to women living in homelessness, and to offer a connection to First Parish Waltham (FPW) and other faith communities. These goals are accomplished by providing a weekly opportunity to knit, participate in meditative coloring, or other art practice, introduced through a circle of care and conversation. A staff chaplain organizes and attends each session, offering spiritual companioning and connection to resources in town. FPW members donate supplies, volunteer time, and offer a special welcome to women attending FPW church services or events.

**Partnering Opportunities:** First Parish members are encouraged to continue providing supplies for the program and to attend weekly sessions. Information about other programs addressing homelessness will also be made available.

## **Charles Webster Potter Place Clubhouse**

Potter Place Scholarship Fund

**The Project:** Potter Place is a non-profit clubhouse model vocational rehabilitation program working with people with mental illness in Waltham. The program serves approximately 150 people annually. Members seeking to improve their lives through education are at a sigificant disadvantage due to the stigma of the larger population and are often held back by financial constraints. Funding will establish a scholarship fund to help members return to school and further their education. Money will help with tuition costs, books, transportation to and from continuing education sites, testing expenses, and other expenses.

Partnering Opportunities: We will encourage recipients to share their successes with the congregation.

**The Project:** The Chesterbrook Community Foundation has planned and hosted a fall party for the children of the Chesterbrook Gardens, Dana Court, and Prospect Hill public housing developments for several years and will do so again in the Fall of 2019. The board of the Chesterbrook Community Foundation (CCF), with help from students and alumni of the Bentley Service-Learning and Civic Engagement Center, will staff the party. In addition, the grant will allocate funds to the Chesterbrook and Dana Court Learning Centers to help pay for snacks and supplies for regular programs.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Members of First Parish and especially the youth groups are invited to participate, as they have in the past.

## **Community Day Center of Waltham**

**Medical Advocacy**

The Project: As an outgrowth of the 2018 project, Transportation and Advocacy, the proposed project, Medical Advocacy, will enable the Center to continue to provide its guests with transportation to detox and rehabilitation facilities as needed. It will also provide transportation to medical/dental appointments either through the purchase of bus/train transit passes, ride shares, or the reimbursement of mileage costs/expenses to volunteer drivers/advocates. Individuals who struggle with homelessness often ignore medical/dental issues simply because they cannot get to appointments. While some guests require an advocate, others are perfectly fine on their own to use public transportation. This program will support the needs of both.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Several members of First Parish are actively involved with the Day Center, and there will be an initiative to offer training to serve as Medical Advocates.

**The Project:** The Partnership again plans to provide a free, family friendly event for all residents of the city to enjoy, as well as to showcase resources and businesses in downtown Waltham. Artists and musicians will demonstrate their talents. Local businesses, private organizations, and volunteers will work together to organize and promote the event to make it inclusive of all people living in Waltham and surrounding areas.

Partnering Opportunities: Members are invited to volunteer with the event, as well as to attend the festivities.

**Healthy Kids Summer Program**

**The Project:** Healthy Waltham proposes to conduct an innovative youth program focused on healthy eating, nutrition, and physical activity at the Waltham Middle School summer program for special education students. The students will learn about healthy eating, growing and harvesting local food, where our food comes from, and how to prepare healthy snacks. Locally sourced vegetables will be used, and the Director will lead lessons on healthy physical activity and movement.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Healthy Waltham hopes to collaborate with congregation members interested in making healthy, environmentally just food choices in a program similar to the UUA "DOVE" program (Demonstrating Our Values through Eating). Members are also encouraged to volunteer at the monthly Watch City Market mobile food pantry, as well as to participate in, or lead, a special Waltham Walk.

The Project: The Golden Door is a fully developed and audience-tested musical about immigrants past and present. It explores the struggles and challenges faced by immigrants, and it promotes the values of tolerance and understanding. The play helps audiences see past skin color, appearance, language and customs and to see the universality of our common humanity. Funding will support performances of this musical on a Waltham community stage and at four Waltham elementary schools.

**Partnering Opportunities:** The group continues to hold performances at the church and will encourage the participation of members from every generation.

## **Meadowscaping for Biodiversity (MS4B)**

Intentional Gardening: Planting Native Plants for Community Resilience

**The Project:** Proposes to provide a workshop at First Parish to show the importance of intentional gardening—landscaping with native plants—with the intention of restoring lost wildlife habitat and essential biodiversity. MS4B staff, Brandeis, and Waltham High students will demonstrate how every garden can serve as a source of food and habitat for stressed populations of beneficial insects, pollinators, and birds. The students will explain the roles native plants play in supporting the environment and will demonstrate how to select and plant native perennials.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Members of MS4B will lead a session in the religious education youth program focused on biodiversity; will conduct a workshop for the First Parish community involving the landscaping of the church; and will continue to educate the community by maintaining the plantings on the church triangle.

**The Project:** This organization's mission is to reduce loneliness and isolation and to improve the lives of Waltham's older population. NWC provides volunteer companionship to underserved older adults. Statistics show that loneliness among elders is a major physical and emotional risk factor. To address this, NWC will match "telephone friends" with older Waltham adults who can benefit from a weekly connection. This new program builds on NWC's ability to pair companions with older adults for in person relationships.

**Partnering Opportunties:** Members of First Parish are encouraged to volunteer as phone friends, and/or to become clients themselves.

This project builds on their "Volunteering and Community Connections" project of the previous year. They plan to run community service activities through the Day Habilitation and Community Based Day Support adult day programs and Recreation Program.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Opportunities for Inclusion will partner with First Parish by inviting the congregation to join them on volunteer service trips and to attend a celebratory dance event.

The Project: UUMA will continue to grow their accompaniment networks and to recruit and train new volunteers. Its networks provide accompaniment to federal and district court hearings and to Burlington ICE, raise funds for bail and legal fees, post bond and get people released from detention, connect people to legal support, assist finding housing and support families, and organize public actions. UUMA is a member of the Safe Communities Coation which is launching a campaign to pass legislation to protect immigrants statewide.

**Partnering Opportunities:** UU Mass Action will provide a range of opportunities, materials and training so that members can take action and engage in the shared work of improving lives.

## Waltham Boys and Girls Club Club Café – Free Youth Meal Program

The Project: Club Café will provide nutritious snacks and meals to local youth throughout the year. The meals will be prepared in the Club's own commercial grade kitchen. Evening dinners will be served throughout the school year and lunches will be served during school vacations and summer break. In addition to serving food, Club Café will educate and inspire members to make healthy eating choices. Workshops and cooking lessons will provide a safe hands-on experience for participants to learn about nutrition, explore the benefits of locally grown food, try foods of different cultures, and consider how their food choices contribute to their overall health and wellbeing. Teen leaders will conduct a year long outreach campaign to facilitate the process.

**Partnering Opportunities:** Church members can participate in food service at the Café and/or with the summer distribution program. For the past two years Club members have helped unload the truck for the church Pumpkin Patch initiative.

**The Project:** The goal of the program is to promote health, nutrition and personal dignity in the community by offering matching funds to SNAP/EBT recipients at the Waltham Farmers' Market. Since 2011, volunteer organizers at the market have dedicated countless hours in support of its program to provide dollar-for-dollar matching of up to \$10 per customer per week to spend at the market. In this time, the market has seen steady growth in the program both in terms of dollars spent and in the number of people who come to the market specifically to use their SNAP dollars on fresh, local food.
