"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate

"Promises, Promises"

Back in the day, I was a Girl Scout. I bet some of you reading were Scouts too. I still remember the pledge we started each meeting with these words:



"I will do my best to be honest and fair, friendly and helpful, considerate and caring, courageous and strong, and responsible for what I say and do, and to respect myself and others, respect authority, use resources wisely, make the world a better place, and be a sister to every Girl Scout."

I took being a Scout pretty seriously. I loved selling those cookies, sure...but I also loved helping people, doing projects with my troop, earning merit badges, and so on. And I really thought about those words. They were a covenant that was affirmed by all scouts not one developed, as we are doing here at First Parish in Waltham - but one that nevertheless articulated a commitment we made to the kind of behavior, and the kind of people, that we would try to be.

The world has become a challenging place and the way that we're living, and dying, in the United States seems even more troubling - particularly over the last decade. Too often when things go wrong people resort to violence, either physical or verbal, to make their points - and the idea of us being one family gets lost in the struggle.

I'm not giving up on the idea that we can do better. We can do better here at First Parish in Waltham, and we can do better as the individuals who call this place our spiritual home. What are the promises that we want to make to one another? What are the ways in which we want to live - as Unitarian Universalists, as members and friends of this church? That's what we're exploring these days, as we focus on supporting a mission for this congregation, and making a covenant with one another to help us live together as people of faith. It seems to me it's work worth doing...and I hope you will want to be part of it. See you in church!

<u>What's Going on in our UU Faith?</u> <u>You Should Know about This!</u>

Dear Loved Ones,

There are some important changes being presented within our denomination that will have a lasting impact on our faith tradition and our leadership. Remember, Unitarian Universalism is a "Living Tradition", which means we understand revelation to be ongoing: nothing is set in

stone. As the natural world and society in general grows and responds to change, so do we.

With that in mind, I hope you will educate yourselves on these items and participate in congregational discussions that will follow in the near future. Voting on these things will happen at our UUA General Assembly (GA) in June - close to us this year in Pittsburgh - so you may also wish to consider representing FPW as a delegate to GA. Our Warrant meeting to elect FPW delegates will take place on February 5th, after our worship service.

Electing a new UUA President:

Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray will be completing her six year term as UUA president this year. Currently Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt is running unopposed for that position. Deb and I are both very excited about her candidacy and how her leadership at the UUA will nurture and grow our denomination. She would be the first female, queer person of color to hold that position. You can learn more about her <u>here.</u>

The 8th Principle:

This proposed addition to our UU Principles has been in the development stage for several years. Almost 300 churches have already adopted it, and our congregation is engaged in studying this proposed change to the fundamental ways in which we describe our beliefs. There will be a vote on the 8th Principle at GA. You can learn more about the 8th Principle <u>here</u>.

Proposed changes to Article 2 of the UUA Bylaws, Principles and Purposes:

Article 2 is the foundation of our larger tradition and the covenant to which all of our congregations pledge themselves when they become members of our UUA. It was last revised in 1987 and has therefore been the subject of a UUA Commission study in recent years. Significant revisions to Article 2 will be voted on at this year's GA, and if this motion passes with a majority vote, there will be another (final) vote, needing a ²/₃ majority, at GA in 2024.You can learn more about proposed revisions to Article 2 here.

As you can see, there are lots of exciting proposals circulating in our "Living Tradition!" Please inform yourselves and be ready for opportunities to discuss it all further.

Friday February 10th, 6:00pm Come have some fun! Everyone is welcome


