#### Minister's Musings: From Rev. Megan Lynes, Parish Minister

Dear Ones,

This past weekend, as the news in Israel and Palestine unfolded, I found I could barely breathe. Like you, I am grieving all the lives



lost, and so very scared about what the future holds. In an email exchange with our parishioner, Joan Bone, she put it this way: "Hate is a horrible emotion that makes people do horrible things." There is simply so much generational trauma that influences every action and reaction, and no clear solution to help keep everyone safe. The actions of a few, affect us all. We are broken hearted, wanting to help, and in need of one another now more than ever.

Sometimes when we are most rattled and terrified, the best thing we can do is head towards each other. As Mr. Rogers' mother told him, "Look for the helpers." One example of that might be to attend a vigil, or donate to a peace-keeping organization, or support someone you love by listening deeply without giving advice or your

own opinion. Let's remember to reach out to the members of our community (or beyond of course,) who might be most emotionally affected by all that is transpiring. A friend of mine has relatives in Israel and I sent her a text to ask how her family is. She replied that only two friends has contacted her about her family and she felt deeply alone. Reaching out just to check in might make a big difference to someone you know too.

Tonight at 7 pm there is a vigil at Temple Beth Israel in Waltham, and Deb José will be there to represent our congregation. Their congregational president, Linda Ungerleider, asked if we might offer a prayer, and so Deb José and I created one. We include it here to share with you.

"Good evening. My name is Deb José, and I am the president of the board at the First Parish in Waltham, Unitarian Universalist. I bring greetings and love from our entire congregation to all of you. It is my honor to be here with you tonight. Our congregation is completely brokenhearted about all that has happened, and we join our hearts with yours.

We each may pray differently, but our hearts are united to comfort one another, show our support, and reach for the next right thing to do, together. And it is in that spirit that I offer this prayer.

Spirit of Life and Love,

In this time of shock and grief, we gather to seek solace and strength. We need one another when we are scared and uncertain, furious, heartbroken, or alone. We give thanks for this important moment, in which we may look in one another's eyes, and find comfort and companionship.

Tonight we pray, not for easy answers, because the complexity of our world defies simplicity. We acknowledge the temptation to surrender to hopelessness, when the world's pain is so utterly overwhelming. In the midst of horror, we are tempted to turn away. And sometimes we must, to protect ourselves.

Yet, here we are, side by side, praying for a way forward to peace. We will not give in to despair, nor will we stop trying to birth love in the world. Grant us the grace to return to that divinely child-like place within us, where we see all others as interconnected.

Spirit of Life and love, guide us in all we do, instill in us the wisdom to seek understanding, the courage to act with compassion, and the strength to persist in the face of adversity. May our actions be a testament to the enduring power of love.

Tonight we pray for peace, healing, and unity.

May it be so."

#### Beyond Categorical Thinking Workshop: 1st weekend in November.

"Will the new minister hear me? Will my concerns and needs be met? Will the minister understand what I'm living with? How will the community respond to our minister?"

In answering these questions, a picture of the "ideal minister" (categorized by age, gender identity, nationality, physical or cognitive ability, race, sexual orientation, etc.) comes to mind. With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into certain categories. At times, as we get caught up in comparing candidates to our "picture," we can even forget what it is we hoped for in a minister.

On the weekend of November 3-5, First Parish of Waltham will participate in the *Beyond Categorical Thinking* workshop offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) for congregations involved in the search for a new minister. The First Parish Search Committee invites all congregational leaders, members, and friends to participate in this workshop.

In the workshop First Parish members will:
☐ Consider the hopes, expectations, and concerns they have for a new minister
☐ Learn more about the ministerial search process, and
☐ Explore how thinking categorically about people sometimes interferes with choosing the
best candidate.

The Beyond Categorical Thinking program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the search process for a new minister. This program includes a three-hour BCT workshop, split into two 90 minute Zoom sessions and Sunday's sermon.

Zoom in on Friday, November 3, 7:00 -8:30 pm for Part 1 and Saturday, November 4, 10-11:30 am to participate in this UUA-sponsored workshop, led by Rev. Amanda Schuber. Rev. Schuber will also preach by Zoom on Sunday, November 5.

Even if you can't make or stay for the entire workshop, please plan to come to what can.

The selection of a minister is important. The *Beyond Categorical Thinking* workshop is another opportunity for everyone in our congregation to be a part of that process. This experience will provide guidance for the search committee in our work.

#### Don't forget to vote on whether to adopt the 8th Principle!

As we approach the October 22nd congregational vote on adopting the 8th Principle, members of the Adult R.E. and 8th Principle committees wanted to reach out to you, our friends, to answer some frequently asked questions such as this one:

We are now less than two weeks away from our October 22nd congregational vote on adopting the 8th Principle. Members of the Adult R.E. and 8th Principle committees continue with our effort to answer some frequently asked questions, such as this one:

## Q. Why does the 8th Principle focus on racism? Why not include other prejudices and forms of injustice?

A. Historically, within the UUA women, and members of the LGBTQIA+ community, have experienced increasing visibility in ministry and leadership positions, and inclusion in the formation of programming and policies. Unfortunately, the UUA hasn't supported Black UUs consistently since the Civil Rights era. For example, it starts with a betrayal of Black UU members in the late 1960's [1], a lack of continued support for the initiative to be an Anti-Racist, Anti-Oppression Multi-Cultural (ARAOMC) organization in the early 2000's [2], and a crisis based on hiring discrimination in 2017 [3]. The 8th Principle focuses on racism in response to these and other inconsistencies in the treatment of Black UUs. Many people of color have been attracted by the values and potential of UUism, but their souls have been repeatedly wounded by lack of accountability in the UUA. In addition, the 8th Principle does refer to dismantling other oppressions, but is focused on the formation of a community that becomes whole by recognizing the importance of dismantling racism.

## Chaplains on the Way Is a Featured Partner for Lexington's upcoming *Voices on the Green* performance on October 20

Chaplains on the Way has been named as the Community Partner for Lexington's acclaimed storytelling and music series, Voices on the Green, presenting its fall production on the theme of "Home" on Friday, October 20, at 7:00 PM. The program is presented at First Parish in Lexington (7 Harrington Road, on the Battle Green), and tickets for the show are now available through the VOG website (https://voicesonthegreen.org/). Tickets not sold in advance will also be available at the door on the evening of the performance.

"Home" offers up stories from six individuals, sharing reflections that range from heartbreaking to hopeful to hilarious. A woman (Mercedes) from an abusive home becomes unhoused for years before turning her life around; an Indian woman's (Tejpreet) multi-faith neighbors come through in a time of sectarian violence; a man's (Dave) stable childhood community provides a compass that guides him through life; a city dweller (Victoria) makes the most of her new life in rural Oklahoma. An indigenous woman (Chali'naru) prevails in the face of landlords' anti-poverty discrimination; a man (Robert), hopeless at simple carpentry, is challenged by his wife to take on daunting home improvement projects.

Mercedes, a member of the COTW community, will make her debut at the show as a storyteller; Chaplains on the Way receives a donation from proceeds for the show - so please come and join Mercedes, Jill Gaulding and others from the COTW community in celebrating the importance of "Home" on October 20!

Music complementing the theme will be provided by acclaimed singer/songwriter Kemp Harris. The show is hosted by award-winning spoken-word artist Regie O'Hare Gibson. Voices on the Green partners with a community organization carrying forward work that aligns with the performance theme.

Voices on the Green is a program of First Parish in Lexington. Those who have attended previous shows have remarked on the amazing sense of community connection engendered when diverse storytellers and musicians perform. Founded in 2017 as a community-building endeavor to develop new voices and new relationships in the community and to create connections between performers and audience, the series now attracts a wide audience from many parts of the greater Lexington community. #### We have wheels for you!


