Minister's Musings: From Rev. Megan Lynes, Parish Minister

When I was a child, October meant one thing: Halloween. It was a time when the boundary between the mundane and the mystical seemed to blur, and the imagination was given free rein. My family and I eagerly anticipated this magical day of intergenerational playfulness. One year, my dad became a purple wizard, complete with a long beard he



glued to his chin strand by strand, and a hand dyed robe and a majestic staff. Our front door transformed into a portal to a world of enchantment, and he stood there, ready to greet the neighborhood kids with a twinkle in his eye and a cauldron of treats in his hands. Our Halloween memories were filled with laughter, joy, and a sense of togetherness.

Halloween, with its familiar customs like pumpkin carving, trick-or-treating, and donning spooky attire, carries a rich history. Its origins trace back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, a Gaelic term pronounced as "SAH-win." Samhain was a pagan celebration to mark the end of summer, marked by bonfires and costumes to ward off

spirits. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a day to honor saints, and All Saints Day absorbed some Samhain traditions. The evening before All Saints Day became known as All Hallows Eve, later shortened to Halloween.

Fast forward to the present day, and I still adore Halloween. But I notice the ways our culture's obsession with violence has crept into the Halloween landscape. As a parent now, I found myself standing in the aisles of a Halloween-themed store, surrounded by gruesome costumes and decorations that seemed to glorify bloodshed and terror. The turning point came when a bloodied chainsaw prop, activated by movement nearby, revved up and swiped near my head. I was horrified by the realism and gore.

So often the words to ancient hymns hold timeless grains of truth, and this one resonates this week. "God of Grace, and God of Glory" has this refrain:

Cure thy children's warring madness; bend our pride to thy control; shame our wanton, selfish gladness, rich in things and poor in soul. Grant us wisdom, grant us courage, make thy peace our daily goal, make thy peace our daily goal.

There is meaning and purpose to contemplating death, facing our fears, and honoring the souls gone before us. But we already have enough violence in our society; we don't need to further glorify it. Let's ensure that Halloween remains a holiday where families can create joyful memories together, where harvest festivities abound, and where the violence stays at bay.

A message from the Music and Choir Director: Emma Campbell

When we think about this month's theme of "Heritage", many people automatically think about precious or rare things that need preserving for the benefit of future generations. There are other things that we have acquired that perhaps we are not so keen to preserve - unruly curly hair that rarely looks 'tidy'; or a predisposition to cancer of the colon. How to deal effectively with things we consider a burden can be just as difficult as deciding on effective methods of preserving the things we value.

With this in mind, sadly, it is time to turn our thoughts to the harpsichord that is in the Sanctuary. Larry Philips was the Music Director here from 1982 to 2001, and he donated the instrument that is just below the pulpit. "Why don't you play it?" - I hear you cry. The simple answer is that it is like the lemon that is in my fruit bowl at home. It's great - but really not all that versatile. Partly, this is because it is a harpsichord - they went out of fashion because they weren't that useful. It is also because it is in a terrible state of repair, offering the player (and tuner) many obstacles that need to be dealt with.

In November 2002, the church obtained quotes for restoring the instrument into a condition that would make it more playable. The cheapest option was \$6,890 for 111.5 hours of work at \$60/hour. Given that the cost of labor has risen, and that the harpsichord now has more than just a damaged soundboard, the Music Committee has a

number of difficult decisions ahead of them. Whether you like it or not, the harpsichord is part of your heritage as a friend or member of First Parish in Waltham. Should we keep something that cannot be played? Its future is in your hands. Beyond Categorical Thinking

THINK OF A MINISTER. DON'T THINK OF AN ELEPHANT.

Chances are you thought of both. And distinct images perhaps came to mind. In terms of a minister, what images came to mind? Was it a person of a particular gender, race, or age?

Beyond Categorical Thinking is a highly recommended part of the search process for our congregation. In finding the person who would be the best match for our minister, we could potentially overlook or even let biases keep us from knowing that a particular person would be the best match for us. Other congregations have assumed that their ideal minister looks a certain way, and often ministers who are not white or male or heterosexual or able-bodied or of a particular age or class are discounted and seen as "less than" in some ways.

Credentialed ministers in our faith who are People of Color, LGBTQ+, disabled, young, old, working class, etc. still face discrimination as part of the ministerial search process. In our efforts to find the best match, our congregation will host a Beyond Categorical Thinking worship workshop.

Rev. Amanda Schuber will meet with our Search Committee, facilitate a three-hour conversation and lead the Sunday service. We will have a chance to examine how we can avoid letting prejudice become a part of our search process. This is yet another way for us to put our faith into lived experience and improve the odds that regardless of identity, we will find the minister who is the best match for us and who will serve us well.

This opportunity allows the entire congregation fuller participation in the search process. It will allow us to explore our hopes and concerns for a new minister, learn more about the search process, and see how our own history (both personal and congregational) might interfere with our efforts in this search.

O. How would the 8th Principle change things at First Parish?

A. At Paula Cole-Jones's 8th Principle Learning Group meeting last week, this was one of the topics. Her question centered more on how each person had changed since their congregation had adopted the 8th Principle. The answers included: reaching outside circles to build Beloved Community, having brave conversations with more honesty, needing to expand comfort zones, finding out what it's like to be in the minority, and recognizing the effects of white supremacy culture on ourselves and the world around us.

At First Parish, we have already incorporated many of these actions into our lives, learning journeys, and congregational activities. We encourage you to think about your own visions for change, but let's envision one of the best possible changes - membership expansion. If we vote to adopt the 8th Principle, we would be able to promote this commitment to building Beloved Community, which would in turn help us draw new visitors from all races that admire or share that same commitment. We hope that we can count on you to help make it happen.




We have wheels for you!
