Minister's Musings

In worship on Sunday, we heard the story of Brother Juniper, who was 13th century Franciscan monk, often remembered for his extreme acts of humility and simplicity. According to legends and stories from the Franciscan tradition, Brother Juniper was known for giving away his possessions, including clothing, to those in need. We were treated to a lighthearted skit acted by a group of parishioners spanning generations, who eagerly stepped forward to participate, (some with a run through, and some without!) Leslie's commitment was so convincing in her portrayal of a stooping elderly man that it required a

double-take for the congregation to realize it was all in good fun. When Autumn found themself unexpectedly in the spotlight, they seized the moment with a flourish, wielding a push broom like a pro. And Deb José, with her mix of humility and enthusiasm, was the perfect embodiment of Brother Juniper, and of course this congregation's collective spirit. Together, the actors delivered the message: our church transcends the physical building, finding its true essence in the spiritually generous souls who comprise this congregation. Much like an improv theatre performance where the golden rule is to always say "yes" to the offers made, you radiate a heartwarming "say yes" spirit. This unity and willingness to support one another exemplify the heart of a healthy faith community.

A message from your Music and Choir Director: Emma Campbell

Have you ever wondered what it would be like if you didn't have thumbs? I can't say that it has frequently crossed my mind, except when playing music written for harpsichords, spinets, and other early keyboard instruments.

Early keyboard music was played without the thumbs – apparently it

made your fingers look more elegant, dainty and 'attractive'. It was also extremely uncomfortable – crossing your middle finger over the others was something I found really tricky when learning to play the harpsichord at college. Just as well I am not following that method on Sunday when I play the Prelude, composed by Couperin. (I didn't follow that method back in the 90s when I was learning either!)

In celebration of thumbs, the Offertory makes incredible use of the thumb on my right hand to play the melody louder than all the other the other layers. Composed by Arvīds Žilinskis, the piece reflects the love he has for countryside in, his homeland. At the end of the First World War, his family were displaced to Southern Ukraine. This is where piano lessons started, which continued on return to Latvia.

The first two pieces in Sunday's service, 'Windmills' and 'Elegy (In Autumn)' tell a story in their own way. The Postlude I have chosen is inspired by the following words:

The great rock in the ocean stands And battles with the waves for ever.

Rather maintaining the dark, brooding, and almost menacing mood that opens the piece, the end is triumphant. It is also marked fff (very, very loud) and 'with emphasis'. Don't you wish that every story could have a happy ending, eventually? I look forward to finding out what stories and other books we will be discussing on Sunday – it's a mystery, that's for certain.

As we approach the October 22nd congregational vote on adopting the 8th Principle, members of the Adult R.E. and 8th Principle committees wanted to reach out to you, our friends, to answer some frequently asked questions such as this one:

Q. Why do we need the 8th Principle when we already have the 1st and 2nd Principles?

A. Firstly, our existing principles do imply the 8th Principle, but they do not explicitly hold us accountable for addressing oppressions directly, especially at the systemic level. In addition, the UU Principles were designed to be dynamic, never a fixed creed. We are proud that UU is the only religion that builds in flexibility to change in the presence of ongoing revealed truth - such as daily news stories that show that racism is alive and well, and uncovering past wrongs that haven't been made right in our congregations and communities. Finally, if you are a white person, we'd like to ask you whether you might question the need for an 8th Principle if you were a person of color.
