"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate

Adventures in Life - and the 'Big Terrible Thing'

I'm just back (and still struggling with jet lag) after a magical trip to Amsterdam, Bruges and France that allowed us to say 'finally done' on a journey we'd planned shortly before pandemic lockdown occurred. I traveled through Amsterdam's canals, Bruges' old city square and enjoyed the *moules frites*

(Mussels and french fries) on the menu. We traveled down the Seine and into Normandy, we celebrated the joys of Paris with the Eiffel Tower twinkling at night.

Through the whole trip - which we began on the night after news of the attack on Israel became public - there were sobering reminders of the horrors of war. We had intended this to be a trip of both beauty and sobering sadness, and it was. On the one hand, visits to Auvers-sur-Oise, where Van Gogh lived the last two months of his life; and Giverny, where Monet painted his amazing "Water Lilies" canvasses. On the other hand, we walked through the Anne Frank House in Amsterdam, tears streaming down our faces at the continuing pain of the world having lost such a bright light.

We celebrated the Normandy countryside, but walked the sand where the disastrous Omaha Beach operation occurred during D-day, later seeing the cemetery where thousands of good young people lie. On our visit to Arromanches, above the Juno Beach area where Canadian soldiers fought, we passed a mural on a wall: two little girls, chalk in hand, who wrote, "Please No More War - Love."

France was on the highest state of security alert while we were there. Repeated bomb threats at the Louvre and Versailles, military guards with AR-15 rifles in the streets, and I flinched and looked every time a siren approached in tandem with others behind it. We went to the Marais, the Jewish section of Paris, to the Jewish Museum and the Shoah Memorial. On a wall were the names of the "Righteous Gentiles" who are inscribed at Yad Vashem in Israel - French and other nationalities who helped French Jews to hide, or escape, or survive during World War II. Among them, inscribed at Yad Vashem in 2005, were the names of Rev. Waitstill and Martha Sharp, Unitarians who risked their lives repeatedly to help get Jewish children out of Europe during the war. "Thy names, most holy, be forever blessed," I thought over and over.

Actor Matthew Perry, who died last week far too young, wrote a book entitled "Friends, Lovers, and the Big Terrible Thing." That 'Big Terrible Thing', for me, is war - the horrible reality that was all over Europe, and is all over our lives right now. The chance that war and our need as humans to triumph over one another with violence will probably not go away. I hold to the mural of the two little girls, and pray for an end to the 'big terrible thing' - peace. May it be so in our lifetimes.

On Monday evenings, I'm often in a building one block away from our church, doing my best to keep up with the other string players in Waltham Philharmonic Orchestra. We have been working hard on the music for our concert on Sunday afternoon. (Details are below.) This week, we had our first rehearsal with the piano soloist for Rachmaninov's 'Piano Concerto No. 2' - it is an extraordinary piece.

Unfortunately so is the piano. It was out of tune, the sustain pedal needs some TLC so it doesn't squeak, it sounded like there was at least one broken string, the legs are a little wobbly and the hinges

that attach the lid to the body of the piano are no longer connected to the body of the instrument.... And yet Victor, the soloist, gave it his all. He chose to work with the imperfections, knowing the piano was far from perfect before he agreed to play with us this season. I confess that I forgot to play in one section of the second movement. I had lost count during my resting measures because I was mesmerized by the incredibly beauty of what was coming out of an instrument that seemed so inadequate for the task at hand. I was not the only person who missed their musical entry - even the conductor was distracted at one point.


Our settled minister - when we engage one - may not be 'perfect'. We all have our flaws, and there are things we cannot do - however hard we may try. That does not mean there cannot be beauty in what we can achieve together, and it won't be fun, exciting, or nervewracking. Like Victor, we may have to celebrate what we do have and make the most of it, rather than longing for things that are unattainable.

Tickets for Sunday's concert are available. By then, the piano will have received some attention from the technician who looks after ours in the Sanctuary. Hopefully, the players at the front of the orchestra will no longer be distracted by a squeaking pedal that occurs out of time, or any of the other extraneous sounds it makes. Perhaps they will have become so used to them they are simply no longer noticing them. You could come and try to identify all the 'flaws' in the piano or our playing, but that does not occur to me as fun. How about coming to appreciate the joy that comes from working hard together to overcome challenges? Being in the audience is an important role. Just as a minister needs a congregation, musicians need an audience. A supportive one helps to bring out the best in us, and we would love to see you there.

Might the Care Crew be a rewarding job for you?


