Minister's Musings: From Rev. Megan Lynes, Parish Minister

Dear First Parish Community,

Sometimes someone asks me what Unitarian Universalists believe, and it never fails to catch me off guard. How I want to be able to succinctly sum up our faith! And how very much I want to avoid saying that we can all believe whatever we want. (That just feels vapid to me, and I'd rather say something about how our faith invites us into a lifelong quest for truth and meaning, and that one of the ways we do that, is here in community.) I must admit though, that despite

being a minister, I don't often feel I have just the right reply at my fingertips.

What helps me, and perhaps it helps you too, when faced with a question about what we believe, is to discern the underlying curiosity of the person who's asking. Are they seeking a comparison with their religious upbringing, curious about what a service might be like, or perhaps wondering whether atheists (or theists!) are welcome among us? Maybe they want to know if we're judging them. Like addressing sensitive topics with a child, understanding the heart of the question can guide our response. Say too much and the eyes glaze over. Say too little and an opportunity is wasted.

The good news is that pretty much every Sunday at First Parish we have new visitors. We get to practice! This is not the ministry of the soap box. It's an act of genuine curiosity about the other. Who is this person beside me? What brought them to church? Certainly they came here seeking something; did they find it? Can I help them find it here?

This past week I found myself talking with a visitor about how poverty keeps us all separated from one another. She told me that she loved seeing an unhoused person reading a poem during the service, and that she felt safe because she hadn't known that a church would value the contribution of someone without money. In my mind, I thought I could hear the question she'd found an answer to: will you treat me with respect? The profound intention from the depths of our faith tradition, is a resounding yes. The lived experience of each human among us, will always be our litmus test.

Within our diverse community, our goal is to celebrate the uniqueness of each person's life, and to honor their personhood. We do all we can to create an environment where individuals can think for themselves about life's mysteries, wonders, pains, and joys. We lean on one another when life is too hard to bear. We make each other laugh just to feel alive together. We fight for each other within the broader context of justice. We allow ourselves to feel, to learn and be transformed. We seek to live a life that matters, and to be of use. Perhaps it could even be said that how we live our faith is more important than how we explain it.

Or, in the words of A. Powell Davies, "Life is just a chance to grow a soul."

Make (and Bake) Bread for Sunday's service at First Parish - Together!




