Holidays - the Yin and the Yang

I'm writing this on Tuesday morning, the day after the second big rain and wind storm in two weeks. The first one didn't amount to much around these parts; this last one, however, was something else - 70 mph wind gusts, torrential rain, flooding, power outages, and more. At my

house a falling birch tree 1-½ doors down took out all the power lines for most of my street...Eversource has not even estimated when the power will be back. And at church yesterday part of a tree limb fell and whacked my car hood, giving it a good dent. The internet connection at the church was up and down, the fire board went off (no fire, just technical gremlins) and...it was a day.

And of course, it's now less than a week before Christmas. The tree at our house is half decorated, I haven't started wrapping stuff (and won't be doing that in the dark), and all in all, you might surmise that I'm feeling a bit... stressed. So as I write this - sitting in another warm church with power and internet and heat - I'm aware of the yin and the yang of this time. I think we all have to realize that global warming - which I refer to as global weirding - is going to cause more storms like the most recent one. We have to not only be ready for this kind of stuff, but recognize our own part in what's going on. And...while I could easily decide to flip out a bit about the unwrapped gifts and the food I'll likely have to throw out from the fridge, I know darn well that these are First World problems.

I, after all, have a house and a car. I have friends who are offering to house my husband and me and let us take a hot shower. And I'm pretty confident that - as inconvenient as all this is - it's going to pass in a few days, and things will return to 'normal' as we have known it. Not so for all of us, and not to be taken for granted.

At times like this, and at this time of the year, I like to read an old piece by Rev. Clarke Dewey Wells called, "You Be Glad at That Star!" It's not only charming, but a reminder about the simple things in nature that are emblematic of what *really* is important.

He wrote: "Several years ago and shortly after twilight our 3 1/2 year old tried to gain his parents' attention to a shining star. The parents were busy with time and schedules, the irritabilities of the day and other worthy preoccupations. 'Yes, yes, we see the star – now I'm busy, don't bother me.' On hearing this the young one launched through the porch door, fixed us with a fiery gaze and said, "You be glad at that star!' I will not forget the incident or his perfect words. It was one of those rare moments when you get everything you need for the good of your soul – reprimand, disclosure and blessing. It was especially good for me, that surprising moment, because I am one who responds automatically and negatively to the usual exhortations to 'pause-and-be-more-appreciative-of-life.' Fortunately, I was caught grandly off guard."



I am grateful for the reminders in this story. Things happen - to all of us. And hopefully, they resolve...and with the resolution often comes appreciation of that which is most important in our lives, at this time of year and all the year. Despite the bumps and turns in the road, I hope that you, too, will find time to stop, to gaze up in the clear night sky or listen to music that lifts you, and celebrate those tiny moments. And be *glad* at that star.

Our next read is *Small Mercies* by Dennis Lehane. Would you like to discuss it together? We'd love to have you join in!

In the summer of 1974 a heatwave blankets Boston and Mary Pat Fennessy is trying to stay one step



ahead of the bill collectors. Mary Pat has lived her entire life in the housing projects of "Southie," the Irish American enclave that stubbornly adheres to old tradition and stands proudly apart.

One night Mary Pat's teenage daughter Jules stays out late and doesn't come home. That same evening, a young Black man is found dead, struck by a subway train under mysterious circumstances.

The two events seem unconnected. But Mary Pat, propelled by a desperate search for her missing daughter, begins turning over stones best left untouched—asking questions that bother Marty Butler, chieftain of the Irish mob, and the men who work for him, men who don't take kindly to any threat to their business.

Set against the hot, tumultuous months when the city's desegregation of its public schools exploded in violence, *Small Mercies* is a superb thriller, a brutal depiction of criminality and power, and an unflinching portrait of the dark heart of American racism.

Coming in the New Year "An Evening of Music and Fun" - Saturday, January 27th at 6:30 PM




