"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate



"Can't We All Just Get Along?"

Many of you probably remember the beating suffered by Rodney King on March 3, 1991 at the hands of members of the LA Police Department. The video of the attack he suffered went worldwide, and at the trial that followed, three of the four officers were acquitted and the jury could not reach a verdict on the fourth officer's case. That led to six days of riots and the death of 63 people, with another

2,383 injured. The riots ended after the California National Guard were called in along with Marine Corps and Army officers.

In speaking about the violence as it unfolded, King said, "Can't we all just get along?" A good question, back then, and now as well. Today our country is reeling from the beating to death of Tyre Nichols, brutally attacked by five police officers in Memphis while other city employees were complicit in their lack of timely response to this tragedy. Almost every day, it seems like we hear accounts of mass shootings or other violence occurring in our cities, in malls, in schools. And it continues without end.

We are in a tough place, and churches are not immune to the stress and sometimes the confrontational behaviors that pit person against person. Part of the reason we are working on a relational covenant at First Parish in Waltham is because there have been too many experiences, shared by you who make up this church, around unhappy, hurtful, or angry encounters with others who are members, friends, or regular attendees. This is NOT ok and this can not be the way that 'business as usual' unfolds at church. We hold within our own hands the power to end such behaviors and to lean toward exercising care, love and acceptance. We can decide to chart another course for ourselves, one that models the kind of community, the kind of world, we want to live in. We don't have to wait for someone else to come in and do this for us; it's up to us, and we have the power.

At Sunday's transitions workshop we started work on a relational covenant for this congregation - work that will continue in the coming weeks. There's good reason to do this - read the newspaper headlines, or take a look outside your window. There are real people all around us - people who may not think the same, or look the same, as we do... but they are people who deserve our love, respect and care, for they too are our siblings. "Can we all get along?" I hope - for all our sake - that the answer is a resounding 'yes' that we will dedicate ourselves to achieving.

From the Music and Choir Director

With the Theme of the Month being about 'love', I feel there are so many choices for music that I almost didn't know where to start. There are so many different types of love – my passion for ice cream is different from my love of daffodils (though NEVER cut ones in a vase) so I have chosen to kick off the month with three contrasting pieces.



The first piece by Bach that I fell in love with was the very last Prelude in his second book of Preludes and Fugues. I had played other Preludes from both books, but was having to prepare this piece for a competition. Though in a minor key, it doesn't stay that way for long. The colors I hear as I read the music (yes, like most people read words in their head, I can hear music by reading it) are incredibly varied. The piece seemed very bland as I learnt each hand separately, as only in the last few measures are there opportunities for playing more than one note at a time. As I started to play with both hands at once a whole new world of sound opened, and I fell in love.

On Sunday I will also be playing some 'cheese'! Made famous by Richard Clayderman, the Offertory is a piece of music I remember encountering at my grandmother's house. She had tapes of his and Klaus Wunderlich which we would listen to in the evenings. There was no TV in the house, so staying with her for a week at a time was always a musical journey. I loved exploring her recordings of everything from Abba to Holst's 'Planet Suite'.

The Postlude is a quirky take on one of my other passions. Its title, 'In the Shed', feels like

a wink towards heading into the garden with a spade or similar in one hand and a cup of tea in the other. For me, gardening is relaxing – whether mowing the lawn or putting something in a new home in the ground. My garden is also a spiritual place for me, so playing a piece of music about a shed in a church on a Sunday feels totally natural!

Purple Hibiscus by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie

A 2003 O Henry Prize winner, and was shortlisted for the 2002 Caine Prize for African Writing and the 2004 Orange Prize. In Purple Hibiscus, she recounts the story of a young



Nigerian girl searching for freedom. Although her father is greatly respected within their community, 15-year-old Kambili knows a frighteningly strict and abusive side to this man. In many ways, she and her family lead a privileged life, but Kambili and her brother, Jaja, are often punished for failing to meet their father's expectations. After visiting her aunt and cousins, Kambili dreams of being part of a loving family. But a military coup brings new tension to Nigeria and her home, and Kambili wonders if her dreams will ever be fulfilled. Adichie's striking and poetic language reveals a land and a family full of strife, but fighting to survive. A rich narration by South African native Lisette Lecat perfectly complements this inspiring tale.
