From the Music and Choir Director

Dear Beethoven

You are, and have been for many years, been my musical hero. This is not because of the large sound and range of colors produced by your orchestral works, or that your style of composition was ahead of its time. Neither is it because your compositions were so hard to sight read, that after having people mock the music because it "sounded like a dirge" you actually had it written in contracts that there needed to be a rehearsal before concerts featuring your music. (I applaud that you helped give birth to the professional musician.)



Beethoven was open to change, and his music evolved as he was exposed to new ideas. Beethoven's compositions illustrate different phases in his life. The first highlights a composer who knows his craft, gives a hint of the genius that is to come, but generally follows the conventions of the time. The second phase illustrates someone with full command of the resources of the instruments, and the possibilities for breaking musical rules with incredible effects. Many of Beethoven's most famous pieces were composed during this phase. Then there is a final phase, where the personal stresses Beethoven has endured become evident. The pieces from this period of his life are fewer but WOW! Beethoven was deaf but this did not halt his musical imagination. His final symphony has an orchestra and a choir (which enters part of the way through the final movement.) In those days, concert halls did not have fire doors and the choir was expected to leave while singing. How dramatic!

What I love, passionately, is that amidst all the drama, the technical demands of his music, and the challenge to execute it while making it seem effortless, there are moments of incredible tenderness and vulnerability. Sunday's Prelude comes from Beethoven's early phase of composition. It moves Leslie G to tears within a few measures – something I discovered by unhappy accident. She is not alone in having a connection to this piece. Billy Joel 'borrowed' the main melody for the chorus of 'This Night'. You can hear it about 58 seconds into this link <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?</u> <u>v=wNOXu_yoDYI</u>. Beethoven's piece is longer than average for a piece played for worship so please arrive early – getting out of bed five minutes earlier might be worth it!

Shelter in Place by David Leavitt

It is the Saturday after the 2016 presidential election, and in a plush weekend house in Connecticut, an intimate group of friends, New Yorkers all, has gathered to recover from what they consider the greatest political catastrophe of their lives. They have just sat down to tea when their hostess, Eva Lindquist, proposes a dare. Who among them would be willing to ask Siri how to assassinate Donald Trump? Liberal and like-minded—editors, writers, a decorator, a theater producer, and one financial guy, Eva's husband, Bruce—the friends have come to the countryside in the hope of restoring the bubble in which they have grown used to living. Yet with the exception of one brash and obnoxious book editor, none is willing to accept Eva's challenge.

Shelter in Place is a novel about house and home, furniture and rooms, safety and freedom, and the invidious ways in which political upheaval can undermine even the most seemingly impregnable foundations. Eva is the novel's polestar, a woman who moves through her days accompanied by a roving, carefully curated salon. She's a generous hostess and more than a bit of a control freak, whose obsession with decorating allows Leavitt to treat us to a slyly comic look at the habitués and fetishes of the so-called shelter industry. Yet when, in her avidity to secure shelter for herself, she persuades Bruce to buy a grand if dilapidated apartment in Venice, she unwittingly sets off the chain of events that will propel him, for the first time, to venture outside the bubble and embark on a wholly unexpected love affair.

A comic portrait of the months immediately following the 2016 election, Shelter in Place is also a meditation on the unreliable appetites—for love, for power, for freedom—by which both our public and private lives are shaped.
