"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate

The Interim Leader's Tasks: All About Leadership

The interim time is all about leadership transition - among members of the staff and sometimes, members of the congregation. Among the highlighted changes that this interim religious professional is focusing on are the following key elements:



- Helping to identify changes needed in program structure and staffing
- Clarifying the multiple dimensions of programmatic leadership and helping to navigate the shifts in leadership that accompany times of transition
- Helping to empower the congregation in developing strength in systems and leadership
- Modeling new approaches, practices and procedures
- Helping the congregation focus on a set of quantifiable, achievable goals and objectives for the next several years
- (Still to come this year): Beginning to organize for a search for a new settled religious leader

Often these leadership changes are viewed, during interim times, as 'spring house cleaning' because frequently, the arrival of interim leadership is an opportunity for the congregation or its professional leaders to re-examine existing behaviors and job profiles and recalibrate for the future. It is also true that during this period, the changes that come are experienced much like an extended case of influenza: "Why are all these changes happening? What was wrong with the way we've always done it?"

During the time I've been at First Parish in Waltham we've seen many changes in the ways in which we do, and think, about different parts of the congregation's life. We are blessed with the half-time ministry, focused on pastoral care and worship, of Rev. Becky and will soon bid her a fond farewell as she goes off to pursue areas of ministry that connect with her passions for chaplaincy and pastoral care. Our amazing Office Manager/Music Director, Emma Campbell, has moved so many elements to help institute organizational change and growth in our administrative systems - and the music provided through a Hymn of the Month, our growing choir, our guest musicians, and care of the congregation's musical instruments - has been noteworthy (pun intended!) The addition of Kevin (KJ) Robertson Jr. to our staff as Acting Facilities Coordinator has further supported our return to consistent, reliable care of the church and its possessions with a friendly face connected to all that is done in care of our property.

What about other leadership structures and issues? First Parish in Waltham has had to function much like a lay led congregation for several years. Returning to systems that bring the calling, talents and gifts of a professional staff with the dedication and love of you, the congregation's members and friends - is a dance where we are trying to both find the balance – and not not step on each others' toes. Like any congregation that is small to mid-sized, leadership has shifted depending on the church's leadership and governance structures and those involved in the congregation.

The current system involving a board of managers who work as 'champions' in different areas, while challenged in some ways, is functioning more effectively these days, and you all should consider yourselves warmly encouraged to engage with programs and activities of the church where your engagement could make an essential difference!

All of this congregation's leaders - professional and lay - are focused on fulfilling the congregation's mission and vision – the one that you, the members are working to set – and carry it forward, partnering with you to build a church that will provide hope, inspiration, programs, and support. It is absolutely true that we share this ministry together.

All these elements are part of the tapestry of First Parish in Waltham, and they contribute to the gifts that both lay and professional leaders can offer to Waltham and to the wider UU community.

From the Music and Choir Director

Ireland is a tourist destination for many different reasons – the landscapes, the food, the beverages, the compact cities, wonderful music, a style of dancing that (frankly) looks like some type of self-defense training where you learn to ankle-sweep your opponents in multiple rather vicious ways. There are so many different reasons for visiting Ireland that I am in danger of turning into a travel guide. However, I am fairly certain that White Mountain is not on many peoples' bucket list.

At just 326 meters high (1070 feet) it is more of an afternoon stroll to the top than a mountain climb. Located in County Wexford, it doesn't seem to feature on any websites as a tourist attraction and this seems a little strange to me. Why? It is the title of a well-known Irish folk melody.



The arrangement being played as Sunday's Prelude is by Ernest John Moeran (1894-1950). The title given by him is '**The White Mountain**' – as if this is particular White Mountain is the best. (There are other White Mountains in Alaska, Australia, Hawaii, India, and probably many more). Considered an Anglo-Celtic composer, due to his half-English and half-Irish background, Moeran's music is little known, even inside the UK. His output consists mainly of songs and piano music, as well as a few chamber works.

At First Parish we are beginning to think about stewardship, and all that it means and entails for our community. Moeran chose to ensure that the things he loved would be preserved and available for future generations by writing them down and capturing them in music. Similar thoughts might be in your minds and hearts as you listen to Moeran's music. How will you be sharing your love for all that is – and all that can be -- First Parish in Waltham?

A Message from our UUA President:

Showing Up for Trans, Nonbinary+, and LGBTQIA+ Community

Dear Friends,

You all are so much in my heart. These are heartbreaking and terrifying times. An onslaught of oppressive laws and policies are threatening the well-being of our children, young people and adults, and the very fabric of communities. I know how hard you all are working to care for your people and communities while also organizing for justice. I see you. I love you. And you inspire me in your witness and your depth of pastoral care and commitment.

I am praying especially for all our trans and nonbinary+ kids and adults, their families, and the communities supporting them. Too many trans and nonbinary+ people are living in an environment where policy makers are criminalizing their very existence.



My heart is also with all of you in frontline communities and states. I know you are holding so much – too much. We are in the fight to provide support and safe harbor with you, as we have been so many times throughout our history. We may not win every battle but we are in this work for the long haul. And we are digging deeper to expand our partnerships, find new ways to support people, and organize for a future where everyone can fully be who they are and flourish in their identities.

As Unitarian Universalists, we are clear and unapologetic. Our LGBTQIA+ siblings are sacred, whole, and divine. We understand the full expression of the diversity of gender and sexuality is a gift. As progressive people of faith, we know this is a fight for everyone's humanity.

As an Association, we have shown up for trans and nonbinary+ youth and individuals through words and actions. I want to make sure you are aware of these resources for your own efforts and as additional support for members of your communities.
