From the Music and Choir Director

Music Sunday - coming to FPW on Sunday!

Music is part of Worship each week so why have a week when there is more of it than usual during worship? We may all have our different perspectives on what "worship" means, and what it involves. However, Merriam-Webster's online dictionary gives a definition that I love:

"Worship: to honor or show reverence for a Devine being or supernatural power"



Music-making is an activity found in all cultures across the history of time. For me, it has the power to alter my emotions - to make me cry or to calm me. It can transport me to a different time and place, sometimes by evoking powerful memories that I didn't know I had. Not all music does this, and sometimes the same piece of music has different responses. The journey of exploring music that is new to me can be incredibly rewarding. Around 6 years ago I had my first experience of witnessing the powerful effects that music can have on others. I was visiting my late father-in-law in hospital - the result of a fall. Battling dementia, he was mostly non-verbal and struggled to recognize anyone other than his wife. There were quite a number of us visiting him, and he was brought into the day room where there was a piano. Hanging back, so he was not overwhelmed by lots of faces he could not recollect, I explored the contents of the piano stool. I found a book of numbers from musicals and my husband (Michael) suggested I give the keys a try. I wiggled my fingers, my brother-in-law broke into song, and Michael came to turn pages. The piano was terribly out of tune, the singing in an uncomfortable register, Michael was distracted and turned two pages at once - the ensemble fell apart. On turning round, my late father-in-law (Bob) was gripping the table and shaking, and my sister-in-law was crying. What had I done? I was mortified. I rushed over to realize that Bob was racking with silent laughter, and my sister-in-law was moved at seeing any kind of emotion on his face. As I approached, Bob spoke to me - the first time in some weeks that he had put a sentence together.

While your response to Sunday's music may not be so strong, I do hope there will be something in the selection that allows you to have a connection via a 'supernatural power'. My gratitude for their commitment and perseverance goes to the Choir. Each week they have to learn something new, while having their mistakes pointed out. This takes courage! I am also thankful that the Worship Team, who have crafted a service out of our musical ideas, are such a lovely group of people to work with. Their creative thinking and attention to detail means we will all be in safe hands for the service. I hope to see you there, supporting your other congregants and being transported to an unexpected realm.

"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate

"Break Forth My Vision of Ministry Clear"

One of my favorite hymns is "Wake, Now, My Senses" (#298 in our gray hymnbook), written by Rev. Thomas Mikelson and set to a lovely traditional Irish Melody. It calls to us, in the final verse: "Wake, now, my vision of ministry clear; brighten my pathway with radiance here; mingle my calling with all who will share..."

These words speak not only to the calling of ministry for those of us who serve as religious professionals, but also to the opportunities we have to engage our ministry with the change we hope to see made real in our congregations and the wider world. First Parish in Waltham has had many ministers over its long history, and of course, in recent years there's been plenty of change in the religious leadership you've had as well. As we move toward spring and the 'close' of this church year (historically, ending in the early summer) with another year of ministerial transition ahead, it's also time - even in the midst of change - to start thinking about what kind of minister might best serve the congregation in the years to come.

Sometimes our personal answer to that question is to yearn for someone who is "exactly like Rev. _____ who preached such great sermons." Or perhaps you'll remember fondly another minister who was at the bedside of your loved one as they endured a medical challenge or passed into the mysteries of death. Or you might be thinking of a minister - one you have never met - who is magical with children and youth, exuding love and energy at every turn. Or a religious leader who is both a member of a traditionally underrepresented community (a person of color, a person with a disability, a person who identifies as queer, or another category you can imagine) who will challenge and expand your perspectives on ministry in a changing world.

As you can see, the possibilities are many, and the process for engaging with a new minister is lengthy and of pivotal importance to this congregation as you look to the future. Together, we've worked this church year on drafting a new mission statement, a relational covenant, and developing a vision statement for the congregation. As we are guided by those important elements, we also have the opportunity to consider "what kind of minister" might be right for the congregation now and in the coming years.

On April 30th, we'll explore those possibilities and the process for getting there, both during our worship service and at the transitions workshop that will follow. You'll want to be there - because this is *your* congregation, and it's *your* future that we'll be charting. Sign up_HERE to attend the workshop and lunch on April 30th...and no signup is needed to





Cottage Meetings on the UUA's Changes to Article II

Article II is the section of the UUA's bylaws that includes its purposes and covenant. It currently includes the seven principles. In 2020, the UUA established a commission to



review Article II. That commission is now recommending a new version of the Article that is very different. Instead of the seven principles, there will be six values focused around love.



At this year's General Assembly, there will be the first of two votes on this recommendation. (The second one will happen next year). Our general assembly delegates, Katie Gullotti and Elisse Ghitelman would like to hear your thoughts on these changes.

We will hold several meetings for people to review the proposal and share their thoughts. The first will be in person in the Chapel at noon on Sunday, April 23, led by Scott Tougas. Elisse will lead one on Zoom at another time. We will also have one at Ferry Beach.

Here is a link to the full report. It is twenty six pages, but it is very readable. And here is a **32 minute video** about it if you pre to watch/listen. You do not need to read the report to attend the meetings, but we will only have time for a cursory review. Reviewing the report beforehand will make the meeting much more enjoyable!
