"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate

Passing Over, Rising Up

Tonight at sundown I'll be gathering with my husband and my cousins to celebrate the festival of Passover. It's my favorite holiday of the year, one that our ancestors - and we - have endured, as well as the promise of a life lived in freedom and respect for one another. In the Haggadah we use, there are the traditional elements - the blessing of the candles and the four cups of wine - plus more

contemporary additions. In my cousin's wife's family, there were socialists who fought for freedom and brave souls who hid in the forests during World War 2 in Europe to support the Resistance against Hitler. Our songs and prayers honor them, and our parents and other relatives, now gone from this earth. And most of all, when we end the Seder with the proclamation that we will celebrate "next year in Jerusalem!" we are embracing the hope that the land of Milk and Honey written about in the Old Testament may yet come to us, if we work for it.

On Sunday, the sun will rise on Easter. Christians around the world embrace the story of Jesus, having been crucified for his activism and proclamations of faith, mysteriously rose

from the tomb to take his place in guiding the world toward peace, love and justice. I will admit that Easter is "not my holiday." As a lifelong Unitarian Universalist with strong ties to Judaism and an embrace of earth-based spirituality, I recognize and support all who find promise, hope and strength in this story. It is important as one that reminds us of the role that Jesus has had in the world, as teacher, prophet, spiritual leader, and even faithful rabble-rouser, calling us to our better selves.

The roles of Moses in leading his people out of Egypt and enslavement, and Jesus in preaching and teaching us how to embrace our better selves and make the world a more loving place, are timeless messages of importance right now. This week - no matter what you believe or how you celebrate (or don't), I encourage us all to pause for a few moments, to reflect on the roles in which these exemplars of faith can help move and guide us forward in today's troubled world. And in these days, may trouble pass over your home, and may the goodness and love you hold within you rise up, to lift you and your beloveds toward the promise of a better tomorrow.


Transitions Workshop -Focusing on Vision and the Ministerial Search Process Sunday, April 30th!

Plan NOW to attend our next Transitions Workshop on Sunday, **April 30th** from **12 noon to 3 PM** in Whitcomb Hall and available over Zoom. Lunch will be served.

We will revisit our work on mission/relational covenant/vision prior to those elements moving on for further action, and then we'll focus on the ministerial search process! In order for First Parish in Waltham to be ready to call a new settled minister in the spring of 2024, work has to begin soon to identify and appoint a search committee, prepare a congregational record, and have conversations to focus the congregation's priorities for ministry. And it all will start with our workshop on April 30th! Watch for the SignUp Genius form to let us know you're coming; child care will be available by advance request. For those who can not attend in person a zoom link will be available.

Cottage Meetings on the UUA's Changes to Article II

Article II is the section of the UUA's bylaws that includes its purposes and covenant. It currently includes the seven principles. In 2020, the UUA established a commission to review Article II. That commission is now recommending a new version of the Article that is very different. Instead of the seven principles, there will be six values focused around love.



At this year's General Assembly, there will be the first of two votes on this recommendation. (The second one will happen next year). Our general assembly delegates, <u>Katie Gullotti</u> and <u>Elisse Ghitelman</u> would like to hear your thoughts on these changes.

We will hold several meetings for people to review the proposal and share their thoughts. The first will be in person in the **Chapel at noon on Sunday, April 23**, led by Scott Tougas. Elisse will lead one on Zoom at another time. We will also have one at Ferry Beach.

You do not need to read the report to attend the meetings, but we will only have time for a cursory review. Reviewing the report beforehand will make the meeting much more enjoyable!

Brooklyn, by Colm Toibin
