## *"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate*

#### "Isle of Hope, Isle of Tears"

By the time you read this I will have returned from a trip north, to the Eastern Townships of Quebec, Montreal, and Quebec City. We were motivated to take this trip because of our love of the Louise Penny mystery novels (featuring Chief Inspector Armand Gamache of the

Surete du Quebec) which are set in the Eastern Townships. And we've spent very little time in Montreal and thought that ought to be remedied, so a walking tour of the Montreal Jewish neighborhoods, a visit to the Musee des Beaux Arts and other treats are on that part of our agenda.

But then we get to our favorite places...to Quebec City, with the amazing Musee de la Civilization, and to the Ile d'Orleans, the little island in the St. Lawrence which is where most of the province's fresh fruits and vegetables are grown. Almost entirely Frenchspeaking, it has a fabulous campground and...we just love it. While we're there we'll be driving north and taking a boat to the Grosse-Ile National Historic site, which is the Canadian version of Ellis Island. There, starting in the early 1800s and extending into the 1930s, immigrants to Canada were quarantined and their health assessed before being allowed to emigrate into the country. A very large number of those coming to Canada were Irish, and there is a monument, cemetery, and historic markers on the buildings that remain on Grosse-Ile, documenting the struggle for freedom these people had, as they sought to escape the Potato Famine and other travails in a search for a better life.

The song <u>"Isle of Hope, Isle of Tears,"</u> which is heartbreakingly poignant, was written to commemorate the migration to Ellis Island - but it could have been written about Grosse-Ile...and it certainly reminds me of the struggles that those who are trying to call the United States their home now, are enduring at the southern border. The horror stories of life at the border continue to roll in, as governors of Texas and Florida are reported to have ordered that immigrants be pushed back into the waters of the Rio Grande, forced to struggle through razor wire, and more. This inhumane treatment is counter to what I – and I hope, you – grew up with: the belief that those in search of a better life should be welcomed into this country. The UUA's <u>Side With Love campaign</u> continues to marshall support for those who stand in resistance to cruelty and injustice at the border.

As the days of summer push on, and along with them the unrelenting heat that is killing people at the border - this might be a good moment for us to consider the ways in which we can change the reality those who wish to call the US home are welcomed - or tormented - with, when they seek to enter this country.

#### Health and Caring for Each Other at Church

Our newsletter is on an every-other-week schedule for the remainder of the summer. Our next edition will be published in mid-August.


## **From the Community**
