Dear First Parish community,

In the service on Sunday, we explored the idea that taking risks often involves a time of uncomfortable uncertainty. Flying through the air from one trapeze bar to the next can be unnerving at best, yet being in that liminal zone can also stretch us into useful awareness or change. No matter where we each are on life's journey, I hope that church can be a steady refuge, where we are caught up by caring support when we need it most. We know we are living into our covenant when lives are transformed by the power of love.

I also hope that in the year ahead we find ways to stay curious and open if things are feeling weird mid-leap. The sense I get from many of you is that this congregation has been in a time of transition for quite a few years now, given the pandemic and many staff transitions. This upcoming year of "being in search" for a settled minister is in some ways a continuation of that uncertainty.

"For This Time" - Thoughts from Deborah Weiner Transitional Ministry Associate

"The Love That Casts Out Fear, The Hope That Never Dies"

I'm writing this from the home of my closest friend, in Contoocook, NH. We've come here for a couple of days to mark the six month anniversary of the death of her husband. These are our closest friends, godparents of our

children, and my friend (also named Deb) is struggling through this time of grief and uncertainty. We are glad to be with her with her during this time, living through our pain as we continue to absorb the loss of our beloved friend, Tom Walton.

And today is also the eighteenth anniversary of the time Hurricane Katrina roared through the Gulf Coast, destroying much of the Louisiana coastline and causing damage that - to this day - has not been repaired. I well remember when we heard about this killer storm, while we were camping in New Brunswick, Quebec and Nova Scotia. We found an English language newspaper to read of the approach of the storm and thought about all the people who were in line to be blasted with destruction, grateful that it wasn't us, but stunned at the approaching damage to the Gulf Coast.

Little did I know then that - a year later - I would be in New Orleans, telling stories of the work of the Gulf Coast Relief Fund of the UUA/UUSC and making connections to people who dedicated themselves to working to rebuild their lives and their towns in the midst of unspeakable destruction. Among those people was the Rev. Tyronne Edwards, a community organizer and Baptist pastor, who set out to single-handedly rebuild his town of Phoenix (what a name) in Plaquemines Parish, LA. The town had been completely flooded and the damage was immense...and Tyronne knew that his small group of Black residents were not going to get governmental aid - they would have to do it themselves. Over the course of the next years, the town was restored and rebuilt, and the population is now greater than it was before the storm hit.

I am glad to say that we are still friends with Tyronne Edwards, who continues to do amazing things in Plaquemines Parish. He never gives up, always with his eye on the next thing that will make life in Phoenix better for his community. That kind of resilience is a marker of what we hold when we have a vision for the possibilities that exist in the world for us. Whether large or small, holding such dreams, even in the face of stunning destruction - as we witness now in Maui and in other towns hit by climactic and human-caused disasters - can sustain us. Sustain and inspire us - to achieve what can feel almost impossible, to build on dreams and hope, to achieve something solid and magnificent.

In these coming days of autumn, we have the possibilities in front of us - to rebuild and build anew – inspired by hope, the love we hold for one another, and the belief that together, we can achieve great things. May it be so for us all in this time of promise.

Thursday, September 21 at 2pm Book: Tom Lake, by Ann Patchett

In the spring of 2020, Lara's three daughters return to the family's orchard in Northern Michigan. While picking cherries, they beg their mother to tell them the story of Peter Duke, a famous actor with whom she shared both a stage and a romance years before at a theater company called Tom Lake. As Lara recalls the past, her daughters examine their own lives and relationship with their mother, and are forced to reconsider the world and everything they thought they knew.

Tom Lake is a meditation on youthful love, married love, and the lives parents have led before their children were born. Both hopeful and elegiac, it explores what it means to be happy even when the world is falling apart. As in all of her novels, Ann Patchett combines compelling narrative artistry with piercing insights into family dynamics. The result is a rich and luminous story, told with profound intelligence and emotional subtlety, that demonstrates once again why she is one of the most revered and acclaimed literary talents working today.


When is Your Birthday?
