Passing it On

I had an amazing experience the other day. My younger daughter, Abby, is 29 and a sexuality educator and full spectrum doula. She works for the NYC Health Department, focused on educating and supporting women through the pregnancy, birth, and post-partum phases, focused on

reducing the incidences of maternal and infant mortality that are part of the unfortunate health statistics of New York City and many other parts of the US. It's good and important work, and I admire her for it.

But this past weekend, Abby - 29 and never having spent a day in seminary - officiated the wedding of two of her closest friends from Star Island. The mostly college-aged young adults who work on Star each summer are known as "Pelicans" (ask me why if you are curious) and they live in a tight-knit community all summer. And if they are lucky and caring, they make lifelong friends, just as my spouse Ben and I did, decades ago. Two of those friends had asked Abby to officiate their wedding, and she – and I – was thrilled.

Abby's smart and capable, but...a wedding? Well, it turns out she was more than ready for that. The wedding she carefully planned with the couple was absolutely a knockout ...I read it and re-read it, bursting into tears at the beauty and the values expressed. Loving the image of her standing there, handing on to the wedding couple and all those gathered, her young wisdom, insight, care, and a bit of humor, to make this occasion glorious. WOW, I thought, this is *my* kid, doing something that many of us in the 'religion business' struggle with – offering a moving and meaningful and personal service at what is, for many, the most important day of their lives. And doing it with ease, with inspiration, with care. Just WOW.

In churches and in our lives, we make choices each day about what is valuable and perhaps, about what is worth keeping. Marie Kondo encourages us to ask, "does it bring me joy?' and that is a good question. Another is, 'what will be the value of this thing that I'm holding, to others?' and perhaps, 'what is the legacy I want to pass on to others who will come this way - some day?'

Here at church, many people have been putting in a lot of that same kind of thought (and effort) to figure out what we want new people coming in the doors of the church to see... what is valuable to hold on to...what we say and do with people after we say 'hello.' There is change here, but also an embrace of the questions that are in front of us, around what we offer to others, and how we welcome and celebrate them after they walk or roll in the door.

What do *you* want to pass on, and how can you help First Parish in Waltham build a future that will bless those who have not arrived? It's food for thought!

From Your Director of Religious Education: Yvonne Andrews

Fall is a time of new beginnings. The new school year comes with both excitement and anxiety for both children and parents alike. Any challenges that we may have faced last year haunt us and we fear them occurring again though that may not be the case. As you know, adjusting to the new schedule is a big step in the right direction. By now, school

has been in session for over two weeks for most kids. Hopefully this is going well.

From my experience as a child therapist, I've learned just how important communication between you and your child really is. Let the child express their feelings openly and validate the feelings that are expressed. Minimizing those feelings will make the child feel unheard and that their feelings are not important. Talk to a teacher about any concerns

that you may have or that your child may be expressing. Being proactive will let the school know that you are involved in your child's school success and would like to be kept informed of your child's progress. Spend quality time with your child. Playtime will let your child speak more openly and honestly because the discussion is more spontaneous. My practice as a child therapist is to integrate play into my sessions so that the time we spend together can be both fun and therapeutic.

Encourage getting together with school friends outside of the school day and get to know the parents of their friends. Keep routines going; children feel comfort in knowing what to expect. Prioritize sleep for your child and you as well. Remember adjusting to a new school year can take up to a month for elementary students and two months for adolescents. Adolescents are more self conscious and worry about fitting in. I say all these things because the life of our young people at church takes a similar path as they reintegrate into a community. Covid changed so much for so many, and our life together in person is beginning anew! It's up to all of us to support our children. I encourage all of us to take a deep breath and have a great school and church year!

With that in mind, religious education begins this Sunday. Each week we need at least one helper to join me in leading our group of children. If you are able to volunteer on Sunday or a Sunday soon, let the office know, or text /call me 978-235-1266. I am looking forward to hearing from you!


