Minister's Musings A Message from Rev. Megan Lynes

Lent, the 40 days leading up to Easter, began on Ash Wednesday, February 14, and will end on the Saturday before Easter, March 31st. In the Christian tradition, Lent is traditionally described as commemorating the forty days that Jesus spent praying and fasting in the desert. He stepped back from the urgency and bustle of his public ministry to reflect and gather himself for the last powerful chapter of his life. The story of the time leading up

to the crucifixion of Jesus is one of the great dramas of rejection and despair. It has to come before the Easter rejoicing, because the promise of new life and great hope for humanity would mean nothing if there were not the understanding of this absence.

Some of us may observe Lent, and others, of course, do not. But all of us are invited into this time of introspection. Lent offers us a chance to reflect on our own part in mitigating the suffering of this old world.

Lent shares a focus on atonement with the Jewish tradition of Yom Kippur each fall, where fasting and prayer is accompanied by repairing relationships with

others and God. The Islamic month of Ramadan, soon to begin on the evening of March 10th, is a time to spiritually reflect, pray, and do works of charity. UU's draw from many sources, and have a Judeo-Christian heritage, and thus the invitation awaits us as well, to join in this inner and outer work of introspection and repairing the world.

One might consider two paths forward for the Unitarian Universalist through Lent. The first is to take part in a traditional "fasting" path. One could use Lent to address a bad habit such as texting while driving. Or perhaps giving up voicing negative comments that don't need to be said. Sometimes having time away from a usual habit reminds us that we are more in charge than we think, and we can remember to make better life decisions. The other path one could take is to do something that brings us into deeper connection to the world. This could be reading a poem a day, reaching out to listen to a friend in need, or picking up some trash on a walk. This Lenten season - if you so choose - you too can opt in, or opt out - you might find one of these paths the one you want to follow. You can give something up, or you can give something back.

These last days of winter, leading to the emergence of spring, remind us that if things feel hard right now, with time seasons change, emotions shift, and good things unfold. May your path lead to more awareness, repair, and joy.

Helping the People of Ukraine with Medical Supplies

A Lexington resident is collecting medical supplies to be sent to the Ukrainian people. Would you like to help? Please read on. If you choose to donate, please bring your donations to church and place it in the *marked box next to the photocopier in the hallway outside the administrative office.* And thank you!

Here is a list of items that we have been asked to ship:

(Note, regarding medications: peel the name of patient and doctor from any prescriptions, but leave medication name and dosage on the bottle).

Sealed or Open (even partial dose) prescription medications up to 2 yrs expired Over-the-counter medications up to 2 yrs expired. Vitamins and supplements are also wanted.

Medical supplies (even if expired):

Rubber/Nitrile Gloves

Alcohol/sterilizing wipes and pads

Sterile and Non-sterile dressing

Sterile and Non-sterile Rolled gauze

Adhesive wound dressing

Adhesive bandage tape

Elastic wrap

Eyewear (glasses and contact lenses)

Crutches, Walkers, Wheelchairs and other devices for the handicapped Orthopedic supplies such as foot braces, ankle braces, knee braces, arm slings, etc.

CPAP machines, masks and/or tubing

Chemical Water purifiers (packets/tablets)

Tourniquets

Chest Seals

Chemical Blood Clotting: Celox, Bleedstop, QuikClot

The emergency Compression Bandage trauma Dressing (Israel style)

Nasopharyngeal airways

IV set (or parts thereof)

IV Catheters 18G,20G, 22G

Multi Trauma Dressings

Burn Dressing Hydrogel

Burn spray, cream Abdominal pad (ab pad) Thermal Emergency blanket
Multi Trauma bag/kit
Incontinence supplies (adult diapers and underwear, bed pads, etc.)
Diapers (all sizes and brands, packaged or loose)
Powdered baby formula
NON-LIQUID hand sanitizers, wipes and similar cleaning stuff

Black Lives Matter Banner Stolen from Unitarian Universalist Church

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading (UUCR) has proudly displayed a Black Lives Matter banner on the corner of Summer Avenue and Woburn Street since 2020. In recent months, this banner has been stolen three times.

The banner was first stolen the weekend of Reading's Juneteenth celebration. At that time, Rev. Dr. Laura Solomon, minister at UUCR, began conversations with the Board of Trustees and sent a letter to the congregation calling all into conversation about the incident. "Our faith calls us to live our values out loud," Rev. Solomon wrote. "When actions like this occur, we are called into dialogue with one another and with our community: what does it mean that this happened here? How do we respond?"

The banner was quickly replaced, but was stolen again in January on Martin Luther King, Jr weekend. Rev. Solomon called the congregation to action after this second event, stating, "It is clear that this timing is intentional, and stealing our banner on these dates intensifies these acts of hate... As a faith community, we are called to engage our larger community in the work of love, justice, and liberation."

Over the following weeks, the congregation hung a homemade banner proclaiming "Our sign was stolen. Black Lives Matter." This banner was stolen on February 10th.

Rev. Solomon was clear that "when it comes down to it, a banner is just a

banner," and that the real work and commitment becomes apparent in "the promises we make to each other...[t]hat we might answer the call of dismantling white supremacy culture within ourselves, our organizations, and our society."

Rev. Solomon and leaders from UUCR met with Albert Pless, the Director for Equity and Social Justice in Reading, and with Aymon Langlois, who works with Mr. Pless, to discuss next steps - both for UUCR specifically and for ongoing antiracism work in Reading.

On March 9, UUCR is hosting Black Lives Matter: A Multifaith Gathering for Commitment. UUCR is working with the Reading Clergy Association and the Office of Equity and Social Justice to plan a multifaith service of learning and commitment as we expand our vision of equity, justice, and liberation in Reading. Join us from 1 - 3PM on March 9th at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading, 239 Woburn St, Reading, MA 01867. This service will be followed by opportunities for fellowship, discussion, and planning further engagement with anti-racism work in Reading.

GMA BOOK CLUB PICK; AN NPR BOOK OF THE YEAR

A gripping historical mystery inspired by the life and diary of Martha Ballard, a renowned 18th-century midwife who defied the legal system and wrote herself into American history.

Maine, 1789: When the Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice, Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. As a midwife and healer, she is privy to much of what goes on behind closed doors in Hallowell. Her diary is a record of every birth and death, crime and debacle that unfolds in the close-knit community. Months earlier, Martha documented the details of an alleged rape committed by two of the town's most respected gentlemen—one of whom has now been found dead in the ice. But when a local physician undermines her conclusion, declaring the death to be an accident, Martha is forced to investigate the shocking murder on her own.

Over the course of one winter, as the trial nears, and whispers and prejudices mount, Martha doggedly pursues the truth. Her diary soon lands at the center of the scandal, implicating those she loves, and compelling Martha to decide where her own loyalties lie.

So mark your calendars and start looking through your favorite potluck


recipes. Leslie Gildersleeve will be organizing the potluck – more to come in the next week or two!

Inclement Weather Procedures for Sundays


In case of dangerous weather conditions which occurs on or leading up to Sunday, we will follow these procedures:

- 1. A determination on canceling Sunday worship services will be made by the worship leader (or, in the case of a pulpit guest, the staff worship coordinator) in consultation with the congregation president, by 7:30 AM on Sunday.
- 2. Upon consultation with other worship staff, the service may be moved to zoom-only (originating from the homes of worship leaders).
- 3. If worship is canceled or if it will be held on zoom, a message will be sent to all on the church mailing list, no later than 8:30 AM.
- 4. If worship is canceled or will be held on zoom, an update to the church's website, giving information and (if relevant) a zoom link, will be made by 9 AM.
- 5. In the case of a cancelation of in person worship, all afternoon and evening activities at the church that are sponsored by the church, will also be canceled (and may be rescheduled).
