


Music Sunday: *Transformed by Generosity*

The Massachusetts Bail Fund believes bailing our neighbors out of jail is a necessary strategy to reduce the harm of incarceration, while we fight alongside other community groups to abolish pre-trial detention and supervision. The people we assist would otherwise sit in jail, for months or even years, for no reason other than their inability to pay bail. These pre-trial sentences have devastating far reaching consequences affecting not just those held in the criminal system, but their families and communities. Pre-trial detention results in people losing jobs, housing, custody of their children, and further destabilization such as loss

of regular medical and mental health treatment.


Ferry Beach is the home of a Universalist (now UU) retreat center in Saco, ME. Come on your own, bring a friend or your whole family, but either way - you belong!

Pledge Drive Update



For This Time
Thoughts from Deborah Weiner - Transitional Ministry Associate
"Where Real Salvation Lies"

I hope that you had a good Easter holiday - in whatever way you do or don't celebrate it.

When I was a kid, there were visits to department store Easter Bunnies and a basket of goodies, along with dinner with our family or friends. And as I nurtured my own family, we colored eggs - sometimes with psychedelic results - and had great egg hunts in the yard (if the weather was good enough) or around the house. It was tons of fun.

Church on Easter Sunday, for this lifelong UU of Jewish origin, was an 'interesting' experience. In the church of my childhood and youth (the Unitarian Society of New Haven) the minister 'got around' the conundrum of Easter by arranging for the choir to do Music Sunday that week. For a congregation that

had a lot of Yale professors, humanists, Jews, atheists, agnostics, and refugees from Christianity, it seemed a good way out. Later, as I started preaching on Easter Sundays, I realized firsthand that it was a tough holiday to wrap my head around. I am far from a Christian, and I have readily admitted that Easter is "not my holiday." And yet I recognize its importance in the liturgical calendar and in the lives of so many people around the world. It is a holiday that invites us into the feelings of betrayal, loss, suffering, and rebirth that are so much a part of our own life stories. It encourages us to embrace the hope that comes from thinking about many kinds of resurrection; from embracing the idea (as Rev. Megan shared with us on Sunday) that in the end, "love wins." And that is surely a key message for us all, no matter our theological roots, no matter our current practices. Hope and love are forces that can guide us toward true salvation - and without them, we are likely left wandering (if not in the wilderness, then in a desert devoid of inspiration).

I've also resonated over the years with the stories that have guided our understanding of Jesus' good works in the world: his washing of the feet of the forgotten and the discarded of society, his belief in love as a guiding faith, and much more. So while I don't read the Bible on a daily basis, recently I have found myself particularly knocked off my pins (as it were) by a political candidate's hawking of the "God Bless the USA Bible," which is being sold in an effort, I believe, to fund his own legal expenses and to draw mostly white evangelicals into the fold to support him. This is the person who marched across the White House lawn five years ago to stand in front of a church and hold up a Bible, upside down, waving it at people. This is the person with the "Make America Pray Again" baseball cap, who can't quote a Bible verse or say which book he finds the most meaning from. This is the person who, like Sinclair Lewis' 1927 novel "Elmer Gantry" portrays, fast-talks and manipulates people into believing he is a person of faith, when all he really wants is their money and a way to influence society.

Rev. Jim Wallis, author and theologian, has just published a book which looks at these issues, called "The False White Gospel: Rejecting Christian Nationalism, Reclaiming True Faith, and Refounding Democracy." I plan to read it, and hope you will too. And because these issues of Christian Nationalism, the rising tide of facism, and challenges to our faith and our society are living loudly in my head, I hope to explore these behaviors in our society during an upcoming sermon.

I'd love to know what you think about them -so I hope that you will write to me or make an appointment to talk more. This stuff is about all of us, about our faith, our lives, our path into the future - which makes it surely worth our time to consider them more deeply, in this springtime of change and rebirth. Will you join me in this journey?

A Message from Rev. Megan Lynes - Parish Minister

I could not be more pleased that our Search Committee has selected a fabulous candidate, and that the very same candidate has chosen First Parish as their first choice! Sometimes it doesn't work out that way, and then a congregation enters a another year of interim ministry.

I am looking forward to the week our congregation and our candidate will spend together. (April 27th - May 5th.) There will be chances to experience worship led by our candidate and attend various gatherings. Please come, ask good

questions, help the candidate get a good sense of who you are as a community, and take the time to learn more about our candidate when that information is available. (It's coming soon!)

After the service on May 5th, there will be a congregational vote about whether to call the candidate, and by that time the hope is that our congregation is unified in a feeling that "YES this is the minister we want!" The goal is for First Parish and the settled minister to enter into a covenant "to walk together in the ways according to love."

The candidate will also be looking to experience that feeling of YES by the end of their week with us. But in addition, they are hoping to see a very high percentage of the votes indicating that the congregation is *onboard*. When I was called in Bedford, it was recommended that at least 92% of the congregation voted yes. I tell you this not to scare you, but to give you information you may need. A minister may not choose to stay if numbers indicate that many do not think it a good match. Please take into account how hard the search committee has worked to learn about and vet our candidate. Please

remember that this is the Search Team chosen out of your own respect and trust and democratic process. And after the candidate's name is announced, do speak with the search team members about their endorsement and ask all the questions you can. It should be said aloud that the Search Team wants you to be able to vote yes. AND this needs to be what you think is right. Opt in to the process in any way you can.

And since it is the season of matches being made, I would like to also share with you my own news for next fall. I will be serving 3/4 time in a one year contract position as the minister at Harvard Unitarian Universalist Church, in Harvard, MA. It's 15 minutes from where I live in Stow, and along with being a lovely congregation, I feel I can balance parenting and ministry in a way that will work for this next chapter. I'm excited about it, but I will also miss you all! This year has been and continues to be so meaningful to me. You have won my heart, and I am not saying any goodbyes just yet!


